Mr. WARNOCK (for himself and Mr. TILLIS) introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry

A BILL

To amend the National Trails System Act to direct the Secretary of Agriculture to conduct a study on the feasibility of designating the Benton MacKaye Trail as a national scenic trail.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Benton MacKaye Na-
5 tional Scenic Trail Feasibility Study Act of 2024”.

6 **SEC. 2. FINDINGS.**

7 Congress finds that the Benton MacKaye Trail—

1 (1) is a scenic, nonmotorized trail that traverses
2 approximately 287 miles over some of the most re-
3 nowned forests and mountains in the States of Geor-
4 gia, Tennessee, and North Carolina;

5 (2) showcases a wide variety of scenic views, in-
6 cluding high-elevation peaks, mature forests, and se-
7 cluded waterfalls;

8 (3) passes through wilderness that is rich with
9 biodiversity;

10 (4) passes through 6 designated wilderness
11 areas, the Great Smoky Mountains National Park,
12 and the Chattahoochee-Oconee, Cherokee, and
13 Nantahala National Forests;

14 (5) provides a wide array of easily accessible
15 hikes for novice and intermediate hikers, as well as
16 more challenging trails for backpacking;

17 (6) supports economic opportunities for numer-
18 ous rural communities that benefit from the visitors
19 to the Benton MacKaye Trail spending their money
20 on accommodations, food, and outdoor supplies;

21 (7) runs from Springer Mountain in the State
22 of Georgia, through the State of Tennessee, and ex-
23 tends through the Great Smoky Mountains National
24 Park in the State of North Carolina;

25 (8) is physically accessible; and

1 (9) can be maintained at a minimal cost be-
 2 cause—

3 (A) the Benton MacKaye Trail has been
 4 maintained at the same length since 2005;

5 (B) 95 percent of the Benton MacKaye
 6 Trail is located on Federal land; and
 7 (C) the Benton MacKaye Trail has been
 8 successfully constructed, maintained, and man-
 9 aged by the Benton MacKaye Trail Association
 10 since 1980.

11 **SEC. 3. BENTON MACKAYE NATIONAL SCENIC TRAIL FEASI-**
 12 **BILITY STUDY.**

13 Section 5(c) of the National Trails System Act (16
 14 U.S.C. 1244(c)) is amended by adding at the end the fol-
 15 lowing:

16 “(50) BENTON MACKAYE TRAIL.—

17 “(A) IN GENERAL.—The Benton MacKaye
 18 Trail, a scenic, nonmotorized trail that tra-
 19 verses approximately 287 miles in the States of
 20 Georgia, Tennessee, and North Carolina.

21 “(B) STUDY.—Not later than 1 year after
 22 the date of enactment of this paragraph, the
 23 Secretary of Agriculture, in consultation with
 24 interested organizations (including the Benton
 25 MacKaye Trail Association), shall complete and

1 submit to Congress the feasibility study for des-
2 ignating the Benton MacKaye Trail as a na-
3 tional scenic trail.”.
