A BILL

To direct the Comptroller General of the United States to conduct a review of the Homeland Security Information Network, and for other purposes.

- 1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*
- 2 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**
- 3 This Act may be cited as the “*Streamlining Law En-*
- 4 *forcement Information Sharing Act”*.

1 **SEC. 2. COMPTROLLER GENERAL REPORT ON THE HOME-**
2 **LAND SECURITY INFORMATION NETWORK.**

3 Not later than 1 year after the date of enactment
4 of this Act, the Comptroller General of the United States
5 shall submit to the Committee on Homeland Security and
6 Governmental Affairs and the Select Committee on Intel-
7 ligence of the Senate and the Committee on Homeland Se-
8 curity and the Permanent Select Committee on Intel-
9 ligence of the House of Representatives a report that in-
10 cludes the following:

11 (1) An examination of how the Homeland Secu-
12 rity Information Network is used to share informa-
13 tion with Federal, State, local, Tribal, and territorial
14 law enforcement partners.

15 (2) A comparison of the use, by such law en-
16 forcement partners, on both desktops and mobile ap-
17 plications of the Homeland Security Information
18 Network to the use of other tools, including
19 JusticeConnect of the Federal Bureau of Investiga-
20 tion, which facilitate real-time exchanges of intel-
21 ligence among such law enforcement partners.

22 (3) An assessment of the cost, effectiveness,
23 and efficacy of the Homeland Security Information
24 Network.

25 (4) An assessment of the current policies of the
26 Homeland Security Information Network and the ef-

1 efficacy of such policies in protecting the civil rights,
2 civil liberties, and privacy of individuals.

3 (5) An analysis of any other information the
4 Comptroller General determines appropriate.

5 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

This Act may be cited as the “Streamlining Law Enforcement Information Sharing Act”.

8 SEC. 2. COMPTROLLER GENERAL REPORT ON THE HOME-

9 **LAND SECURITY INFORMATION NETWORK.**

10 *Not later than 1 year after the date of enactment of*
11 *this Act, the Comptroller General of the United States shall*
12 *submit to the Committee on Homeland Security and Gov-*
13 *ernmental Affairs and the Select Committee on Intelligence*
14 *of the Senate and the Committee on Homeland Security*
15 *and the Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence of the*
16 *House of Representatives a report that includes the fol-*
17 *lowing:*

18 (1) An examination of how the Homeland Secu-
19 rity Information Network is used to share informa-
20 tion with—

(A) Federal, State, local, Tribal, and territorial law enforcement and governmental partners; and

1 (B) private sector partners and nonprofit
2 partners from across a variety of sectors, com-
3 munities, and geographic locations.

4 (2) A comparison of the use, by such law enforce-
5 ment partners, on both desktops and mobile applica-
6 tions of the Homeland Security Information Network
7 to the use of other tools, including JusticeConnect of
8 the Federal Bureau of Investigation, which facilitate
9 real-time exchanges of intelligence among such law
10 enforcement partners.

11 (3) An assessment of the cost, effectiveness, and
12 efficacy of the Homeland Security Information Net-
13 work.

14 (4) An assessment of the current policies of the
15 Homeland Security Information Network and the effi-
16 cacy of such policies in protecting the civil rights,
17 civil liberties, and privacy of individuals.

18 (5) An analysis of any other information the
19 Comptroller General of the United States determines
20 appropriate.

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
