UNANIMOUS CONSENT AGREEMENTS

S.J. RES. 49

1.—*Ordered*, That notwithstanding Rule XXII, at a time to be determined by the Majority Leader, in consultation with the Democratic Leader, no earlier than Wednesday, April 30, 2025, S.J. Res. 49, a joint resolution terminating the national emergency declared to impose global tariffs, be discharged from the Committee on Finance and the Senate proceed to its consideration; provided, that there be 6 hours for debate only with the time equally divided between the Leaders or their designees; provided further, that following the use or yielding back of that time, the joint resolution be read a third time and the Senate vote on passage of the joint resolution. (*April 28, 2025.*)
