S. 275, to require the Federal Communications Commission to establish a vetting process for prospective applicants for high-cost universal service program funding, with an amendment in the nature of a substitute.

S. 1570, to amend the Bottles and Breastfeeding Equipment Screening Act to require hygienic handling of breast milk and baby formula by security screening personnel of the Transportation Security Administration and personnel of private security companies providing security screening.

S. 1956, to improve the commercialization of Federal research by domestic manufacturers, with an amendment in the nature of a substitute.

S. 2086, to require the Secretary of Commerce to establish the Sea Turtle Rescue Assistance Grant Program, with an amendment in the nature of a substitute.

S. 2233, to ban the sale of products with a high concentration of sodium nitrite to individuals, with an amendment in the nature of a substitute.

S. 2498, to prohibit unfair and deceptive advertising of prices for hotel rooms and other places of short-term lodging, with an amendment in the nature of a substitute.

S. 2546, to designate the facility of the United States Postal Service located at 100 North Taylor Lane in Patagonia, Arizona, as the “Jim Kolbe Memorial Post Office”.

S. 3277, to amend the Marine Debris Act to reauthorize the Marine Debris Program of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

S. 3475, to amend title 49, United States Code, to allow the Secretary of Transportation to designate an authorized operator of the commercial driver’s license information system.

S. 3788, to reauthorize the National Landslide Preparedness Act, with an amendment in the nature of a substitute.

S. 3849, to promote United States leadership in technical standards by directing the National Institute of Standards and Technology and the Department of State to take certain actions to encourage and enable United States participation in developing standards and specifications for artificial intelligence and other critical and emerging technologies, with an amendment in the nature of a substitute.

S. 3943, to require a plan to improve the cybersecurity and telecommunications of the U.S. Academic Research Fleet.

S. 3946, to designate the facility of the United States Postal Service located at 1106 Main Street in

Bastrop, Texas, as the “Sergeant Major Billy D. Waugh Post Office”.

S. 3959, to require the Transportation Security Administration to streamline the enrollment processes for individuals applying for a Transportation Security Administration security threat assessment for certain programs, including the Transportation Worker Identification Credential and Hazardous Materials Endorsement Threat Assessment programs of the Administration, with an amendment in the nature of a substitute.

S. 4077, to designate the facility of the United States Postal Service located at 180 Steuart Street in San Francisco, California, as the “Dianne Feinstein Post Office”.

S. 4107, to require Amtrak to report to Congress information on Amtrak compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 with respect to trains and stations, with an amendment in the nature of a substitute.

S. 4394, to support National Science Foundation education and professional development relating to artificial intelligence, with an amendment in the nature of a substitute.

S. 4487, to require the Secretary of Commerce to develop artificial intelligence training resources and toolkits for United States small businesses, with an amendment in the nature of a substitute.

Doss VA Clinic:** Committee on Veterans' Affairs was discharged from further consideration of S. 3938, to designate the community-based outpatient clinic of the Department of Veterans Affairs in Lynchburg, Virginia, as the "Private First Class Desmond T. Doss VA Clinic", and the bill was then passed. **Page S5836**

**Honoring the Memory of the Victims of the Mass Shooting at the Fourth of July Parade in Highland Park, Illinois:** Committee on the Judiciary was discharged from further consideration of S. Res. 752, expressing the condolences of the Senate and honoring the memory of the victims on the second anniversary of the mass shooting at the Fourth of July parade in Highland Park, Illinois, on July 4, 2022, and the resolution was then agreed to. **Page S5836**

**Calling for the Immediate Release of George Glezmann:** Committee on Foreign Relations was discharged from further consideration of S. Res. 753, calling for the immediate release of George Glezmann, a United States citizen who was wrongfully detained by the Taliban on December 5, 2022, and condemning the wrongful detention of all Americans by the Taliban, and the resolution was then agreed to. **Page S5836**

**National Airborne Day:** Senate agreed to S. Res. 797, designating August 16, 2024, as "National Airborne Day". **Page S5788**

**Mann Gulch Memorial Tribute Day:** Senate agreed to S. Res. 798, commemorating the 75th Anniversary of the Mann Gulch fire by designating August 5, 2024, as "Mann Gulch Memorial Tribute Day". **Pages S5788–89**

**Fentanyl Prevention and Awareness Day:** Senate agreed to S. Res. 799, supporting the goals and ideals of Fentanyl Prevention and Awareness Day on August 21, 2024. **Page S5789**

**Condemning the Attempted Assassination of Former President Donald J. Trump:** Senate agreed to S. Res. 800, condemning the attempted assassination of former President Donald J. Trump during a political rally in Butler, Pennsylvania, honoring the victims who were killed and injured at the rally, and calling for unity and civility in the United States. **Page S5789**

**Honoring William "Willie" Howard Mays, Jr.:** Senate agreed to S. Res. 801, honoring the life and enduring legacy of William "Willie" Howard Mays, Jr. **Pages S5789–90**

**National Catfish Month:** Senate agreed to S. Res. 802, designating August 2024 as "National Catfish Month". **Page S5790**

#### Measures Considered:

**Tax Relief for American Families and Workers Act:** Senate resumed consideration of the motion to proceed to consideration of H.R. 7024, to make improvements to the child tax credit, to provide tax incentives to promote economic growth, to provide special rules for the taxation of certain residents of Taiwan with income from sources within the United States, to provide tax relief with respect to certain Federal disasters, to make improvements to the low-income housing tax credit. **Pages S5746–49**

During consideration of this measure today, Senate also took the following action:

By 48 yeas to 44 nays (Vote No. 230), three-fifths of those Senators duly chosen and sworn, not having voted in the affirmative, Senate rejected the motion to close further debate on the motion to proceed to consideration of the bill. **Pages S5746–49**

**Authorizing Leadership to Make Appointments—Agreement:** A unanimous-consent agreement was reached providing that, notwithstanding the adjournment of the Senate, the President of the Senate, the President pro tempore, and the Majority and Minority Leaders be authorized to make appointments to commissions, committees, boards, conferences, or interparliamentary conferences authorized by law, by concurrent action of the two Houses, or by order of the Senate. **Pages S5836–37**

**Pro Forma Sessions—Agreement:** A unanimous-consent agreement was reached providing that the Senate convene for pro forma sessions, with no business being conducted on the following dates and times: Friday, August 2, 2024, at 12 noon; Tuesday, August 6, 2024, at 9:30 a.m.; Friday, August 9, 2024, at 10 a.m.; Tuesday, August 13, 2024, at 9:15 a.m.; Friday, August 16, 2024, at 10 a.m.; Tuesday, August 20, 2024, at 8 a.m.; Friday, August 23, 2024, at 11:45 a.m.; Tuesday, August 27, 2024, at 9 a.m.; Friday, August 30, 2024, at 11 a.m.; Tuesday, September 3, 2024, at 2 p.m.; Thursday, September 5, 2024, at 12:45 p.m.; and that when the Senate adjourns on Thursday, September 5, 2024, it stand adjourned until 3 p.m., on Monday, September 9, 2024. **Page S5837**
