Whereas, for two centuries, Jefferson faculty and graduates have been innovators and leaders in education, research, discovery and clinical care, with achievements ranging from the discovery of the mosquito vector for yellow fever and the invention of the heart-lung machine to the development of nationally recognized textile engineering and fashion design programs;

Whereas today, Thomas Jefferson University is a beacon of success for universities across the nation, with a future-focused model for the education of professionals whose careers will extend through the dynamic 21st century:

Whereas, Jefferson has become a research powerhouse whose world-class scholars and investigators work across the spectrum from basic discovery to translation and application of new knowledge; and

Whereas, Jefferson has both a growing role in helping solve global society's most pressing problems and a steadfast commitment to improving life for its local communities and people; so now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That I congratulate Thomas Jefferson University as it embarks on its third century of education, discovery, healthcare, and community engagement.

SUPPORT FOR H.R. 82 AND OPPOSITION TO H.R. 5342

Ms. McCOLLUM. Mr. Speaker, this week the House will consider two bills that aim to fix problems within Social Security law, H.R. 82 and H.R. 5342. I rise in support of H.R. 82, the Social Security Fairness Act. This legislation takes a necessary and long-overdue step forward in improving Social Security and ensuring that retirees across America have access to their hard-earned benefits.

H.R. 82 has strong bipartisan support-the most of any bill during this session of Congress-and there's good reason for that. This bill repeals the Government Pension Offset (GPO) and the Windfall Elimination Provision (WEP), two provisions of Social Security law that reduce and, in some cases, fully cancel out Social Security benefits for Civil Services Retirement system recipients and other public sector employees who have worked in state and local government. The GPO and WEP create financial hardship for America's retired teachers, police officers, postal workers, firefighters, and other public employees and their families who have spent their careers in public service. H.R. 82 bill passed the House by a vote of 327-75, with one Member voting

I oppose H.R. 5342, the Equal Treatment of Public Service Act, an alternative bill proposed to address shortcomings within Social Security law. Unlike H.R. 82, this bill fails to address the GPO and takes the WEP exemption away from millions of Americans who are currently exempt. Additionally, instead of asking the wealthy to pay their fair share, this bill is paid for by expanding the number of people subject to the WEP, resulting in a benefit cut for millions of everyday Americans.

Social Security is the nation's number one anti-poverty program for the elderly and for

This led him to join the U.S. Army where he served in Army Psychological Operations in both Iraq and Afghanistan.

After leaving the military, John moved to Springfield where he graduated from Missouri State University on the President's List, the university's highest honor reserved for those who receive a 4.0 grade point average or higher. He again became involved in politics, serving as the communications director for his friend Bill's gubernatorial campaign. Ultimately, he became employed as a marketing specialist with MediaCom.

John's life was defined by service . . . to his country, to his neighbors, to his family and friends. He was taken from us too soon and will be greatly missed by his father, Steven Errante, his mother, Arla Collins and a host of friends who loved him. It is my great honor to recognize this remarkable individual, and I am praying for peace, comfort and good memories for his family.

His efforts have left a lasting impact, as he has worked to ensure that the voice of the Greek Cypriot community is heard in the halls of Congress and across the United States.

Philip Christopher's contributions have not gone unrecognized. He has received numerous honors, including the Republic of Cyprus Medal of Honor, the title of Honorary Mayor of Kyrenia, and honorary citizenships from multiple Cypriot communities. He was also the first Greek Cypriot to receive the prestigious Ellis Island Medal of Honor in the United States. In 2024, he served as Parade General Chairman of the NYC Greek Independence Day Parade. These awards and recognition are a testament to his exemplary commitment to his community and his invaluable role as a bridge between Cypriot and American interests

Beyond his advocacy, Mr. Christopher has demonstrated significant achievements as an executive in the telecommunications industry and as a board member of various respected organizations. His dedication to excellence in both his professional and community endeavors is an inspiration.

As a co-founder and publisher of the South Belt-Ellington Leader, Marie became known for her work shedding light on the impact of the Brio Superfund site in the 1980s, which eventually led to its remediation. Marie also delved into the political arena, serving on two Mayoral Transition Committees for the City of Houston.

Mr. Speaker, I have no doubt Marie's legacy will be remembered, and my prayers are with her family, her San Jacinto College family, and the South Belt community during this difficult time.
