Res. 115 is not agreed to, and if the requisite 16 signatures have been filed at the desk, Senator Paul, or his designee, be recognized to make a motion to proceed to the consideration of S.J. Res. 117, relating to the disapproval of the Presidential report with respect to the indebtedness of the Government of Ukraine; that there be up to one hour for debate, equally divided, on the motion and that upon the use or yielding back of that time, Senate vote on or in relation to the motion to proceed to consideration of S.J. VISA-MASTERCARD DUOPOLY

Committee on the Judiciary: Committee concluded a hearing to examine breaking the Visa-Mastercard duopoly, focusing on bringing competition and lower fees to the credit card system, after receiving testimony from Roger P. Alford, Notre Dame Law School, South Bend, Indiana; Christopher W. Callahan, Battenkill Books, Cambridge, New York; Doug Kantor, National Association of Convenience Stores, Alexandria, Virginia; Linda Kirkpatrick, Mastercard, Purchase, New York; and Bill Sheedy, Visa Inc., San Francisco, California.

CHINA'S CYBERSECURITY THREAT

Committee on the Judiciary: Subcommittee on Privacy, Technology, and the Law concluded a hearing to examine China's cybersecurity threat, focusing on big hacks and big tech, after receiving testimony from Sam Bresnick, Georgetown University Center for Security and Emerging Technology, Washington, D.C.; Isaac Stone Fish, Strategy Risks, New York,
