SUPPLEMENTAL ESTIMATES OF APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE DE-PARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1926, AMOUNTING TO \$80,345, AND FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1927, \$300,000; ALSO DRAFTS OF PRO-POSED LEGISLATION AFFECTING EXISTING APPROPRIATIONS

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith for the consideration of Congress supplemental estimates of appropriations for the Department of the Interior for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1926, amounting to \$80,345, and for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1927, amounting to \$300,000; in all, \$380,345. Also two drafts of proposed legislation affecting existing appropriations.

The details of these estimates and the proposed legislation, the necessity therefor, and the reason for their submission at this time are set forth in the letter of the Director of the Bureau of the Budget transmitted herewith, with whose comments and observations thereon

SIR: I have the honor to submit herewith for your consideration, and upon your approval for transmission to Congress, supplemental estimates of appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1926, amounting to \$80,345, and for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1927. amounting to \$300,000; in all, \$380,345. Also drafts of proposed legislation affecting existing appropriations.

Supplemental estimates for the fiscal year 1926

Reclaiming lands, Lummi Indian Reservation, Wash. (reimbursable) __ \$65,000

The act of March 18, 1926 (Public, No. 49, 69th Cong.), authorized an appropriation of \$65,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary for reclaiming approximately 3,400 acres of Indian land and 600 acres of privately owned land within and immediately adjacent to the Lummi Indian Reservation in the State of Washington, with provision for return of the construction cost to the Government. It is estimated that the full amount of the authorization will be necessary to carry out the purpose of the act of March 18, 1926.

Payment to certain Sioux Indians of South Dakota for destruction of

During 1895, 1896, and 1897 horses belonging to certain members of the Sioux Nation of Indians residing in South Dakota were suspected of being infected with glanders and many were killed by order of the Federal Government. It was later found that the destroyed animals were not so infected. The act of June 7, 1924 (43 Stat. 477), authorized the Secretary of the Interior to investigate and report the facts to Congress, which he did on December 2, 1924. By the act of March 1, 1926 (Public, No. 32, 69th Cong.), an appropriation of \$15,345 was authorized for the payment of the claims.

Supplemental estimates for the fiscal year 1927

Investigations, Columbia Basin irrigation project_____\$25,000

The purpose of this estimate is to carry into effect the provisions of the act of April 13, 1926 (Public, No. 112, 69th Cong.), section 2 of which authorizes an appropriation of \$25,000 for completing investigations of the feasibility of the Columbia Basin irrigation project.

Coolidge Dam across canyon of Gila River near San Carlos, Ariz. (reimbursable)

The Interior Department appropriation act for the fiscal year 1926 (43 Stat. 1152), appropriated \$450,000 for commencement of construction of the Coolidge Dam, as authorized by the act of June 7, 1924 (43 Stat. 475). The Budget for the fiscal year 1927, page 455, included an item in the same amount for continuing construction

during that year.

Since the submission of the Budget for 1927, an agreement has been made by the Secretary of the Interior with the Southern Pacific Co. for the removal of its tracks from the reservoir site on terms satisfactory to the Government and to the company. The text of this agreement appears in the Congressional Record of April 20, 1926, at page 7712. This action will expedite the construction work, and it is now believed that an economical rate of construction will require, in 1927, in addition to the unexpended balance for 1926 to be made available for 1927, and in addition to the \$450,000 carried in the 1927 Budget, the \$275,000 contained in the estimate herewith.

PROPOSED LEGISLATION

Expenses of Choctaw tribal attorney, 1925 (tribal funds): The Interior Department appropriation act for the fiscal year 1925 (43 Stat. 398), provided that the expenses of the Choctaw and other tribal attorneys of the Five Civilized Tribes should not exceed \$1,500 per annum each during that year. It appears, however, that it was necessary for the Choctaw attorney to incur expenses aggregating \$2,931.46 in properly conducting his work, for which expenses he has been reimbursed to the extent of \$1,500, leaving a balance unpaid of \$1,431.46.

The purpose of the estimate herewith is to provide the necessary additional authorization for expenditure from tribal funds of the Choctaw Nation.

Expenses of the principal chief, Choctaw Nation, 1926 (tribal funds): The authorization contained in the Interior Department appropriation act for the fiscal year 1926 (43 Stat. 1148), limited the expenses of the principal chief of the Choctaw Nation for that fiscal year to \$1,500. During the first eight months of the year necessary expenditures in the amount of \$1,472.83 have been incurred. In order to enable the principal chief to defray necessary expenses during the remainder of the year a further authorization of \$1,000 payable from tribal funds of the Choctaw Nation is required.

The above estimates of appropriations, comprising four items, and the two items of proposed legislation are required to meet contingencies which have occurred since the transmission of the Budgets for the fiscal years 1926 and 1927.

Approval of these estimates and the proposed legislation is recom-

mended.
