Mr. HINCHEY (for himself, Mr. McNULTY, Mr. WALSH, Mr. ENGEL, Mr. GILMAN, and Mr. SANDERS) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Government Reform

A BILL

To establish the Hudson-Fulton-Champlain 400th Commemoration Commission, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Hudson-Fulton-Cham-
5 plain 400th Commemoration Commission Act of 2002”.

6 **SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND PURPOSE.**

7 (a) FINDINGS.—The Congress finds the following:

8 (1) The first European exploration of the Hud-
9 son River and Lake Champlain and the introduction
10 of steam navigation to maritime commerce were

1 events of major historical importance, both in the
2 United States and internationally.

3 (2) In 1609, Englishman Henry Hudson, acting
4 in service of the Dutch East India Company, was
5 the first European to sail up the river later named
6 for him in the vessel HALF MOON, and French ex-
7 plorer Samuel de Champlain was the first European
8 to see the lake later named for him.

9 (3) These voyages were 2 of the most signifi-
10 cant passages in the European exploration and dis-
11 covery of America, and began 2 of the earliest con-
12 tacts in the New World between Native Americans
13 and Europeans.

14 (4) These explorations led to the establishment
15 of Fort Orange, Dutch and later English settlement
16 of what is now the capital city of the State of New
17 York, and settlement of French Quebec settlements
18 as far south as Lake George. From these early set-
19 tlements came an influence on our history, culture,
20 law, commerce, and traditions of liberty which ex-
21 tends to the present day, and which is constantly re-
22 flected in the position of the United States as the
23 leader of the nations of the free world.

24 (5) In 1807, Robert Fulton navigated the Hud-
25 son River from the city of New York to Albany in

1 the steamboat CLERMONT, successfully inau-
2 gurating steam navigation on a commercial basis.
3 This event is one of the most important events in
4 the history of navigation. It revolutionized water-
5 borne commerce on the great rivers of the United
6 States, transformed naval warfare, and fostered
7 international relations through transoceanic travel
8 and trade.

9 (6) The National Park Service owns and oper-
10 ates significant resources in New York related to the
11 early history of the nation and the Hudson River
12 Valley.

13 (7) In 2002 the State of New York enacted leg-
14 islation establishing a State Hudson-Fulton-Cham-
15 plain Commission.

16 (b) PURPOSE.—The purpose of this Act is to estab-
17 lish the Hudson-Fulton-Champlain 400th Commemora-
18 tion Commission to—

19 (1) ensure a suitable national observance of the
20 Henry Hudson, Robert Fulton, and Samuel de
21 Champlain 2009 anniversaries through cooperation
22 with and assistance to the programs and activities of
23 New York, New Jersey, and Vermont;

24 (2) assist in ensuring that Hudson-Fulton-
25 Champlain 2009 observances provide an excellent

1 visitor experience and beneficial interaction between
2 visitors and the natural and cultural resources of the
3 New York, New Jersey, and Vermont sites;

4 (3) assist in ensuring that Hudson-Fulton-
5 Champlain 2009 observances are inclusive and ap-
6 propriately recognize the diverse Hudson River and
7 Lake Champlain communities that developed over 4
8 centuries;

9 (4) facilitate international involvement in the
10 Hudson-Fulton-Champlain 2009 observances;

11 (5) support and facilitate marketing efforts for
12 a commemorative coin, a commemorative stamp, and
13 related activities for the Hudson-Fulton-Champlain
14 2009 observances; and

15 (6) assist in the appropriate development of
16 heritage tourism and economic benefits to the
17 United States.

18 **SEC. 3. DEFINITIONS.**

19 In this Act:

20 (1) **COMMEMORATION.**—The term “commemo-
21 ration” means the commemoration of—

22 (A) the 200th anniversary of Robert Ful-
23 ton’s voyage in the CLERMONT;

24 (B) the 400th anniversary of Henry Hud-
25 son’s voyage in the HALF MOON; and

1 (C) the 400th anniversary of Samuel de
2 Champlain’s voyage.

3 (2) COMMISSION.—The term “Commission”
4 means the Hudson-Fulton-Champlain 400th Com-
5 memoration Commission established by section 4(a).

6 (3) GOVERNORS.—The term “Governors”
7 means the Governors of the States of New York,
8 New Jersey, and Vermont.

9 (4) SECRETARY.—The term “Secretary” means
10 the Secretary of the Interior.

11 (5) STATES.—The term “States”—

12 (A) means the States of New York, New
13 Jersey, and Vermont; and

14 (B) includes agencies and entities of each
15 such State.

16 **SEC. 4. HUDSON-FULTON-CHAMPLAIN 400TH COMMEMORA-**
17 **TION COMMISSION.**

18 (a) IN GENERAL.—There is established a commission
19 to be known as the “Hudson-Fulton-Champlain 400th
20 Commemoration Commission”.

21 (b) MEMBERSHIP.—

22 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Commission shall be
23 composed of 31 members, of whom—

1 (A) 3 members shall be appointed by the
2 Secretary, after consideration of the rec-
3 ommendations of the Governors;

4 (B) 14 members shall be appointed by the
5 Secretary, after consideration of the rec-
6 ommendations from the Members of the House
7 of Representatives whose districts encompass
8 the Hudson River Valley and Champlain Valley;

9 (C) 6 members shall be appointed by the
10 Secretary, after consideration of the rec-
11 ommendations from the Members of the Senate
12 from New York, New Jersey, and Vermont;

13 (D) 2 members shall be employees of the
14 National Park Service, of whom—

15 (i) one shall be the Director of the
16 National Park Service (or a designee); and

17 (ii) one shall be an employee of the
18 National Park Service having experience
19 relevant to the commemoration, who shall
20 be appointed by the Secretary;

21 (E) one member shall be appointed by the
22 Secretary, and shall be an individual knowledge-
23 able of the Hudson River Valley National Herit-
24 age Area; and

1 (F) 5 members shall be appointed by the
2 Secretary, and shall be individuals that have an
3 interest in, support for, and expertise appro-
4 priate to, the commemoration.

5 (2) TERM; VACANCIES.—

6 (A) TERM.—Each member of the Commis-
7 sion shall be appointed for the life of the Com-
8 mission.

9 (B) VACANCIES.—

10 (i) IN GENERAL.—A vacancy on the
11 Commission shall be filled in the same
12 manner in which the original appointment
13 was made.

14 (ii) PARTIAL TERM.—A member ap-
15 pointed to fill a vacancy on the Commis-
16 sion shall serve for the remainder of the
17 term for which the predecessor of the
18 member was appointed.

19 (3) MEETINGS.—

20 (A) IN GENERAL.—The Commission shall
21 meet—

22 (i) at least twice each year; or

23 (ii) at the call of the Chairperson or
24 the majority of the members of the Com-
25 mission.

1 (B) INITIAL MEETING.—Not later than 30
2 days after the date on which all members of the
3 Commission have been appointed, the Commis-
4 sion shall hold the initial meeting of the Com-
5 mission.

6 (4) VOTING.—

7 (A) IN GENERAL.—The Commission shall
8 act only on an affirmative vote of a majority of
9 the members of the Commission.

10 (B) QUORUM.—A majority of the Commis-
11 sion shall constitute a quorum.

12 (5) CHAIRPERSON AND VICE CHAIRPERSON.—

13 (A) The Commission shall elect the chairperson and
14 the vice chairperson of the Commission on an annual
15 basis.

16 (B) The vice chairperson shall serve as the
17 chairperson in the absence of the chairperson.

18 (c) DUTIES.—

19 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Commission shall—

20 (A) plan, develop, and execute programs
21 and activities appropriate to commemorate the
22 400th anniversary of the voyage of Henry Hud-
23 son, the first European to sail up the Hudson
24 River, the 200th anniversary of the voyage of
25 Robert Fulton, the first person to use steam

1 navigation on a commercial basis, the 400th an-
2 niversary of the voyage of Samuel de Cham-
3 plain, the first European to discover and ex-
4 plore Lake Champlain;

5 (B) facilitate Hudson-Fulton-Champlain-
6 related activities throughout the United States;

7 (C) coordinate its activities with State
8 commemoration commissions and appropriate
9 Federal Government agencies, including the De-
10 partments of Agriculture, Defense, State, and
11 Transportation, the National Park Service with
12 respect to the Hudson River Valley National
13 Heritage Area, and the American Heritage Riv-
14 ers Initiative Interagency Committee estab-
15 lished by Executive Order 13061, dated Sep-
16 tember 11, 1997;

17 (D) encourage civic, patriotic, historical,
18 educational, religious, economic, and other or-
19 ganizations throughout the United States to or-
20 ganize and participate in anniversary activities
21 to expand the understanding and appreciation
22 of the significance of the voyages of Henry
23 Hudson, Robert Fulton, and Samuel de Cham-
24 plain;

1 (E) provide technical assistance to States,
2 localities, and nonprofit organizations to further
3 the commemoration;

4 (F) coordinate and facilitate for the public
5 scholarly research on, publication about, and in-
6 terpretation of, the voyages of Henry Hudson,
7 Robert Fulton, and Samuel de Champlain; and

8 (G) ensure that the Hudson-Fulton-Cham-
9 plain 2009 anniversaries provide a lasting leg-
10 acy and long-term public benefit by assisting in
11 the development of appropriate programs and
12 facilities.

13 (2) PLANS; REPORTS.—

14 (A) STRATEGIC PLAN; ANNUAL PERFORM-
15 ANCE PLANS.—The Commission shall prepare a
16 strategic plan in accordance with section 306 of
17 title 5, United States Code, and annual per-
18 formance plans in accordance with section 1115
19 of title 31, United States Code, for the activi-
20 ties of the Commission carried out under this
21 Act.

22 (B) FINAL REPORT.—Not later than Sep-
23 tember 30, 2010, the Commission shall submit
24 to the Secretary a final report that contains—

1 (i) a summary of the activities of the
2 Commission;

3 (ii) a final accounting of funds re-
4 ceived and expended by the Commission;
5 and

6 (iii) the findings and recommenda-
7 tions of the Commission.

8 (d) POWERS OF THE COMMISSION.—The Commission
9 may—

10 (1) disperse funds, and accept donations of per-
11 sonal services and real and personal property related
12 to Hudson-Fulton-Champlain 2009 and of the sig-
13 nificance of Hudson, Fulton, and Champlain in the
14 history of the United States;

15 (2) appoint such advisory committees as the
16 Commission determines to be necessary to carry out
17 this Act;

18 (3) authorize any member or employee of the
19 Commission to take any action that the Commission
20 is authorized to take by this Act;

21 (4) procure supplies, services, and property, and
22 make or enter into contracts, leases, or other legal
23 agreements, to carry out this Act (except that any
24 contracts, leases, or other legal agreements made or

1 entered into by the Commission shall not extend be-
2 yond the date of termination of the Commission);

3 (5) use the United States mails in the same
4 manner and under the same conditions as other
5 Federal agencies;

6 (6) subject to approval by the Commission,
7 make grants in amounts not to exceed \$20,000 to
8 communities and nonprofit organizations to develop
9 programs to assist in the commemoration; and

10 (7) make grants to research and scholarly orga-
11 nizations to research, publish, or distribute informa-
12 tion relating to the early history of the voyages of
13 Hudson, Fulton, and Champlain.

14 (e) COMMISSION PERSONNEL MATTERS.—

15 (1) COMPENSATION OF MEMBERS OF THE COM-
16 MISSION.—

17 (A) IN GENERAL.—Except as provided in
18 subparagraph (B), a member of the Commis-
19 sion shall serve without compensation.

20 (B) FEDERAL EMPLOYEES.—A member of
21 the Commission who is an officer or employee
22 of the Federal Government shall serve without
23 compensation in addition to the compensation
24 received for the services of the member as an
25 officer or employee of the Federal Government.

1 (C) TRAVEL EXPENSES.—A member of the
2 Commission shall be allowed travel expenses, in-
3 cluding per diem in lieu of subsistence, at rates
4 authorized for an employee of an agency under
5 subchapter I of chapter 57 of title 5, United
6 States Code, while away from the home or reg-
7 ular place of business of the member in the per-
8 formance of the duties of the Commission.

9 (2) STAFF.—

10 (A) IN GENERAL.—The Chairperson of the
11 Commission may, without regard to the civil
12 service laws (including regulations), appoint
13 and terminate an executive director and such
14 other additional personnel as are necessary to
15 enable the Commission to perform the duties of
16 the Commission.

17 (B) CONFIRMATION OF EXECUTIVE DIREC-
18 TOR.—The employment of an executive director
19 shall be subject to confirmation by the Commis-
20 sion.

21 (3) COMPENSATION.—

22 (A) IN GENERAL.—Except as provided in
23 subparagraph (B), the Chairperson of the Com-
24 mission may fix the compensation of the execu-
25 tive director and other personnel without regard

1 to the provisions of chapter 51 and subchapter
2 III of chapter 53 of title 5, United States Code,
3 relating to classification of positions and Gen-
4 eral Schedule pay rates.

5 (B) MAXIMUM RATE OF PAY.—The rate of
6 pay for the executive director and other per-
7 sonnel shall not exceed the rate payable for
8 level V of the Executive Schedule under section
9 5316 of title 5, United States Code.

10 (4) DETAIL OF GOVERNMENT EMPLOYEES.—

11 (A) FEDERAL EMPLOYEES.—

12 (i) IN GENERAL.—At the request of
13 the Commission, the head of any Federal
14 agency may detail, on a reimbursable or
15 nonreimbursable basis, any of the per-
16 sonnel of the agency to the Commission to
17 assist the Commission in carrying out the
18 duties of the Commission under this Act.

19 (ii) CIVIL SERVICE STATUS.—The de-
20 tail of an employee under clause (i) shall
21 be without interruption or loss of civil serv-
22 ice status or privilege.

23 (B) STATE EMPLOYEES.—The Commission
24 may—

1 (i) accept the services of personnel de-
2 tailed from States (including subdivisions
3 of States); and

4 (ii) reimburse States for services of
5 detailed personnel.

6 (5) VOLUNTEER AND UNCOMPENSATED SERV-
7 ICES.—Notwithstanding section 1342 of title 31,
8 United States Code, the Commission may accept and
9 use voluntary and uncompensated services as the
10 Commission determines necessary.

11 (6) SUPPORT SERVICES.—The Director of the
12 National Park Service shall provide to the Commis-
13 sion, on a reimbursable basis, such administrative
14 support services as the Commission may request.

15 (f) PROCUREMENT OF TEMPORARY AND INTERMIT-
16 TENT SERVICES.—The Chairperson of the Commission
17 may procure temporary and intermittent services in ac-
18 cordance with section 3109(b) of title 5, United States
19 Code, at rates for individuals that do not exceed the daily
20 equivalent of the annual rate of basic pay prescribed for
21 level V of the Executive Schedule under section 5316 of
22 that title.

23 (g) FACA NONAPPLICABILITY.—Section 14(b) of the
24 Federal Advisory Committee Act (5 U.S.C. App.) shall not
25 apply to the Commission.

1 (h) NO EFFECT ON AUTHORITY.—Nothing in this
2 section supersedes the authority of the States or the Na-
3 tional Park Service concerning the commemoration.

4 (i) TERMINATION.—The Commission shall terminate
5 on December 31, 2010.

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
