To repeal the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (Public Law 111–148) and related health-care provisions.

Mr. MACK introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Energy and Commerce, and in addition to the Committees on Ways and Means, Education and the Workforce, the Judiciary, Natural Resources, House Administration, Rules, and Appropriations, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Speaker, in each case for consideration of such provisions as fall within the jurisdiction of the committee concerned

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## A BILL

To repeal the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (Public Law 111–148) and related health-care provisions.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Revoke Excessive Poli-  
5 cies that Encroach on American Liberties (REPEAL)  
6 Act”.

1 **SEC. 2. REPEAL OF PPACA AND RELATED HEALTH-CARE**  
2 **PROVISIONS.**

3 (a) PPACA.—Effective as of the enactment of the  
4 Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (Public Law  
5 111–148), such Act is repealed.

6 (b) RELATED HEALTH-CARE PROVISIONS.—Effec-  
7 tive as of the enactment of the Health Care and Education  
8 Reconciliation Act of 2010 (Public Law 111–152), title  
9 I and subtitle B of title II of such Act are repealed.

10 (c) RESTORATION AND REVIVAL.—The provisions of  
11 law amended or repealed by the Patient Protection and  
12 Affordable Care Act, or by title I or subtitle B of title  
13 II of the Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act  
14 of 2010, are restored or revived as if the Patient Protec-  
15 tion and Affordable Care Act, and title I and subtitle B  
16 of title II of the Health Care and Education Reconciliation  
17 Act of 2010, had not been enacted.

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
