To ensure election integrity and security and enhance Americans' access to the ballot box by establishing consistent standards and procedures for voter registration and voting in elections for Federal office, and for other purposes.

3	SEC. 101. SHORT TITLE.
4	This title may be cited as the "Verifiable, Orderly,
5	and Timely Election Results Act".
6	SEC. 102. FEDERAL STANDARDS FOR MAIL-IN BALLOTS.
7	(a) In General.—Title III of the Help America
8	Vote Act of 2002 (52 U.S.C. 20901 et seq.) is amended—
9	(1) by redesignating sections 304 and 305 as
10	sections 305 and 306, respectively; and
11	(2) by inserting after section 303 the following
12	new section:
13	"SEC. 304. FEDERAL STANDARDS FOR MAIL-IN BALLOTS.
14	"(a) In General.—When otherwise permitted by
15	State law, any vote-by-mail system used in an election for
16	Federal office must be designed and implemented to en-
17	sure a secure, uniform, and timely system to cast a mail-
18	in ballot in accordance with this section.
19	"(b) Requests.—
20	"(1) In general.—Requests for a mail-in bal-
21	lot under such system may be submitted electroni-
22	cally or by postal mail using a standardized form ap-
23	proved for such requests by the chief State election

official.

1	"(2) Request.—The form for such requests
2	must enable an election official who receives the re-
3	quest to confirm—
4	"(A) the identity of the individual submit-
5	ting the request;
6	"(B) that the individual is validly reg-
7	istered to vote in the jurisdiction where the re-
8	quest is submitted; and
9	"(C) that the individual continues to reside
10	at the physical address where the individual is
11	registered to vote (if different than the mailing
12	address where the ballot is requested to be
13	sent).
14	"(3) Deadline for Submission.—Such re-
15	quest must be submitted by an individual and re-
16	ceived by the office of the State or local election su-
17	pervisor not later than 21 days before the date of
18	the election for Federal office.
19	"(4) Mailing of Ballots.—Upon receipt of
20	such a request, the State or local election supervisor
21	shall fulfill the request by mailing a mail-in ballot to
22	the individual within 3 days.
23	"(c) Requirements for State or Local Elec-
24	TION OFFICIALS.—The office of the State or local election
25	supervisor shall—

1	"(1) record the total number of mail-in ballots
2	sent to voters pursuant to this section; and
3	"(2) include a notation on the voter rolls main-
4	tained by the office and provided to the individual
5	polling locations, which identifies that a voter has
6	received a mail-in ballot and the date that mail-in
7	ballot was sent to the voter.
8	"(d) Ballot Requirements.—
9	"(1) In general.—To be considered validly
10	cast and eligible to be counted in an election for
11	Federal office, a mail-in ballot must—
12	"(A) be marked using blue or black ink
13	and properly designate the individual's vote for
14	each candidate;
15	"(B) be signed by the individual using the
16	same signature the individual used to register
17	to vote;
18	"(C) be dated;
19	"(D) be received by the appropriate elec-
20	tion official no later than the time polls close or
21	the date of the election;
22	"(E) include an attestation, signed by the
23	individual, that the individual submitting the
24	mail-in ballot is—

1	"(i) the individual to whom the ballot
2	was mailed;
3	"(ii) registered to vote in the jurisdic-
4	tion where the ballot is being submitted;
5	and
6	"(iii) submitting the mail-in ballot in
7	lieu of casting a ballot in-person, and will
8	not attempt to cast a ballot in-person after
9	submitting the mail-in ballot.
10	"(2) Return of Ballots in-Person.—An in-
11	dividual may choose to return a mail-in ballot in-per-
12	son to the polling place where the individual is reg-
13	istered to vote in lieu of returning the ballot by mail
14	"(e) Option To Vote In-Person.—
15	"(1) In general.—An individual who receives
16	a mail-in ballot with respect to an election for Fed-
17	eral office may instead vote in-person in such elec-
18	tion if the individual turns in the blank or incom-
19	plete mail-in ballot received by the individual to the
20	polling location where the individual plans to vote in-
21	person.
22	"(2) Provisional Ballot.—If the individual
23	attempts to vote in-person but does not bring their
24	blank or incomplete mail-in ballot to the polling loca-

1	tion, the individual shall be directed to complete a
2	provisional ballot.
3	"(f) Persons Permitted To Possess Mail-In
4	Ballots.—
5	"(1) IN GENERAL.—It shall be unlawful for any
6	person to possess or return a mail-in ballot com-
7	pleted by another person, except as provided in this
8	subsection.
9	"(2) Immediate family member.—
10	"(A) In general.—A person may possess
11	or return a mail-in ballot completed by an im-
12	mediate family member, provided that the per-
13	son does not possess more than two such com-
14	pleted mail-in ballots other than his or her own.
15	"(B) Definition of immediate family
16	MEMBER.—In this paragraph, the term 'imme-
17	diate family member' means the spouse, child,
18	parent, grandparent, or sibling of the person.
19	"(3) Caregiver.—
20	"(A) In general.—A caregiver may pos-
21	sess or return a mail-in ballot completed by a
22	person under the supervision or care of the
23	caregiver, provided that the caregiver does not
24	possess more than two such completed mail-in

ballots other than his or her own.

1 "(B) Definition of Caregiver.—In this 2 paragraph, the term 'caregiver' means an indi-3 vidual who has the responsibility for the care of 4 an older individual, either voluntarily, by contract, by receipt of payment for care, or as a re-6 sult of the operation of law and means an indi-7 vidual who provides (on behalf of such indi-8 vidual or of a public or private agency, organi-9 zation, or institution) compensated or uncom-10 pensated care to an older individual.

- "(4) Incidental possession excepted.—
  The prohibition under paragraph (1) shall not apply to the incidental possession of mail-in ballots by a postal worker or election official acting within the scope of his or her official capacity.
- "(5) Penalty.—Any person who violates this subsection shall be fined under title 18, United States Code, or imprisoned not more than 1 year, or both.
- 20 "(g) Effective Date.—This section shall apply 21 with respect to elections for Federal office held after the 22 date of the enactment of this section.".

"(2) One hour after polls close on the date of 4 5 the election, each voting precinct shall report to the 6 chief State election official the following: 7 "(A) The total number of mail-in ballots 8 received by the voting precinct. 9 "(B) The total number of ballots cast inperson in the voting precinct. 10 11 "(C) Of the ballots reported under sub-12 paragraphs (A) and (B), the number of such 13 ballots that have been counted and the number 14 of such ballots that remain to be counted. 15 "(3) All ballots validly cast in an election for 16 Federal office shall be counted and reported within 17 24 hours after the conclusion of voting on the date 18 of the election. 19 "(b) Effective Date.—This section shall apply with respect to elections for Federal office held after the 21 date of the enactment of this section.". 22 (b) Conforming Amendment Relating to En-23 FORCEMENT.—Section 401 of such Act (52 U.S.C. 21111), as amended by section 102(b), is amended by striking "and 304" and inserting "304, and 305".

10	SEC. 201. SHORT TITLE; FINDINGS AND PURPOSE.
11	(a) SHORT TITLE.—This title may be cited as the
12	"Automatic Voter Registration Act of 2021".
13	(b) Findings and Purpose.—
14	(1) Findings.—Congress finds that—
15	(A) the right to vote is a fundamental
16	right of citizens of the United States;
17	(B) it is the responsibility of the State and
18	Federal governments to ensure that every eligi-
19	ble citizen is registered to vote;
20	(C) existing voter registration systems can
21	be inaccurate, costly, inaccessible, and con-
22	fusing, with damaging effects on voter partici-
23	pation in elections and disproportionate impacts
24	on young people, persons with disabilities, and
25	racial and ethnic minorities, and

1	(D) voter registration systems must be up-
2	dated with 21st-century technologies and proce-
3	dures to maintain their security.
4	(2) Purpose.—It is the purpose of this title—
5	(A) to establish that it is the responsibility
6	of government at every level to ensure that all
7	eligible citizens are registered to vote;
8	(B) to enable the State and Federal gov-
9	ernments to register all eligible citizens to vote
10	with accurate, cost-efficient, and up-to-date pro-
11	cedures;
12	(C) to modernize voter registration and list
13	maintenance procedures with electronic and
14	internet capabilities; and
15	(D) to protect and enhance the integrity,
16	accuracy, efficiency, and accessibility of the
17	electoral process for all eligible citizens.
18	SEC. 202. AUTOMATIC REGISTRATION OF ELIGIBLE INDI-
19	VIDUALS.
20	(a) Requiring States To Establish and Oper-
21	ATE AUTOMATIC REGISTRATION SYSTEM.—
22	(1) IN GENERAL.—The chief State election offi-
23	cial of each State shall establish and operate a sys-
24	tem of automatic registration for the registration of
25	eligible individuals to vote for elections for Federal

- office in the State, in accordance with the provisions of this title.
- (2) Definition.—The term "automatic reg-3 4 istration" means a system that registers an indi-5 vidual to vote in elections for Federal office in a 6 State, if eligible, by electronically transferring the 7 information necessary for registration from govern-8 ment agencies to election officials of the State so 9 that, unless the individual affirmatively declines to 10 be registered, the individual will be registered to vote 11 in such elections.
- 12 (b) REGISTRATION OF VOTERS BASED ON NEW 13 AGENCY RECORDS.—The chief State election official 14 shall—
  - (1) not later than 15 days after a contributing agency has transmitted information with respect to an individual pursuant to section 203, ensure that the individual is registered to vote in elections for Federal office in the State if the individual is eligible to be registered to vote in such elections; and
  - (2) send written notice to the individual, in addition to other means of notice established by this part, of the individual's voter registration status.

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1	(e) One-Time Registration of Voters Based on
2	EXISTING CONTRIBUTING AGENCY RECORDS.—The chief
3	State election official shall—
4	(1) identify all individuals whose information is
5	transmitted by a contributing agency pursuant to
6	section 204 and who are eligible to be, but are not
7	currently, registered to vote in that State;
8	(2) promptly send each such individual written
9	notice, in addition to other means of notice estab-
10	lished by this title, which shall not identify the con-
11	tributing agency that transmitted the information
12	but shall include—
13	(A) an explanation that voter registration
14	is voluntary, but if the individual does not de-
15	cline registration, the individual will be reg-
16	istered to vote;
17	(B) a statement offering the opportunity to
18	decline voter registration through means con-
19	sistent with the requirements of this title;
20	(C) in the case of a State in which affili-
21	ation or enrollment with a political party is re-
22	quired in order to participate in an election to
23	select the party's candidate in an election for
24	Federal office, a statement offering the indi-
25	vidual the opportunity to affiliate or enroll with

a political party or to decline to affiliate or enroll with a political party, through means consistent with the requirements of this title;

- (D) the substantive qualifications of an elector in the State as listed in the mail voter registration application form for elections for Federal office prescribed pursuant to section 9 of the National Voter Registration Act of 1993, the consequences of false registration, and a statement that the individual should decline to register if the individual does not meet all those qualifications;
- (E) instructions for correcting any erroneous information; and
- (F) instructions for providing any additional information which is listed in the mail voter registration application form for elections for Federal office prescribed pursuant to section 9 of the National Voter Registration Act of 1993;
- (3) ensure that each such individual who is eligible to register to vote in elections for Federal office in the State is promptly registered to vote not later than 45 days after the official sends the individual the written notice under paragraph (2), un-

- less, during the 30-day period which begins on the
- 2 date the election official sends the individual such
- written notice, the individual declines registration in
- 4 writing, through a communication made over the
- 5 internet, or by an officially logged telephone commu-
- 6 nication; and
- 7 (4) send written notice to each such individual,
- 8 in addition to other means of notice established by
- 9 this title, of the individual's voter registration status.
- 10 (d) Treatment of Individuals Under 18 Years
- 11 OF AGE.—A State may not refuse to treat an individual
- 12 as an eligible individual for purposes of this title on the
- 13 grounds that the individual is less than 18 years of age
- 14 at the time a contributing agency receives information
- 15 with respect to the individual, so long as the individual
- 16 is at least 16 years of age at such time.
- 17 (e) Contributing Agency Defined.—In this part,
- 18 the term "contributing agency" means, with respect to a
- 19 State, an agency listed in section 203(e).
- 20 SEC. 203. CONTRIBUTING AGENCY ASSISTANCE IN REG-
- 21 **ISTRATION.**
- 22 (a) IN GENERAL.—In accordance with this title, each
- 23 contributing agency in a State shall assist the State's chief
- 24 election official in registering to vote all eligible individuals
- 25 served by that agency.

- 1 (b) Requirements for Contributing Agen-2 cies.—
  - (1) Instructions on automatic registration.—With each application for service or assistance, and with each related recertification, renewal,
    or change of address, or, in the case of an institution of higher education, with each registration of a
    student for enrollment in a course of study, each
    contributing agency that (in the normal course of its
    operations) requests individuals to affirm United
    States citizenship (either directly or as part of the
    overall application for service or assistance) shall inform each such individual who is a citizen of the
    United States of the following:
    - (A) Unless that individual declines to register to vote, or is found ineligible to vote, the individual will be registered to vote or, if applicable, the individual's registration will be updated.
    - (B) The substantive qualifications of an elector in the State as listed in the mail voter registration application form for elections for Federal office prescribed pursuant to section 9 of the National Voter Registration Act of 1993, the consequences of false registration, and the

- individual should decline to register if the individual does not meet all those qualifications.
  - (C) In the case of a State in which affiliation or enrollment with a political party is required in order to participate in an election to select the party's candidate in an election for Federal office, the requirement that the individual must affiliate or enroll with a political party in order to participate in such an election.
  - (D) Voter registration is voluntary, and neither registering nor declining to register to vote will in any way affect the availability of services or benefits, nor be used for other purposes.
  - (2) Opportunity to decline registration Required.—Each contributing agency shall ensure that each application for service or assistance, and each related recertification, renewal, or change of address, or, in the case of an institution of higher education, each registration of a student for enrollment in a course of study, cannot be completed until the individual is given the opportunity to decline to be registered to vote.
  - (3) Information transmittal.—Upon the expiration of the 30-day period which begins on the

1	date the contributing agency informs the individual
2	of the information described in paragraph (1), each
3	contributing agency shall electronically transmit to
4	the appropriate State election official, in a format
5	compatible with the statewide voter database main-
6	tained under section 303 of the Help America Vote
7	Act of 2002 (52 U.S.C. 21083), the following infor-
8	mation, unless during such 30-day period the indi-
9	vidual declined to be registered to vote:
10	(A) The individual's given name(s) and
11	surname(s).
12	(B) The individual's date of birth.
13	(C) The individual's residential address.
14	(D) Information showing that the indi-
15	vidual is a citizen of the United States.
16	(E) The date on which information per-
17	taining to that individual was collected or last
18	updated.
19	(F) If available, the individual's signature
20	in electronic form.
21	(G) Information regarding the individual's
22	affiliation or enrollment with a political party,
23	if the individual provides such information.
24	(H) Any additional information listed in
25	the mail voter registration application form for

- elections for Federal office prescribed pursuant to section 9 of the National Voter Registration Act of 1993, including any valid driver's license number or the last 4 digits of the individual's social security number, if the individual provided such information.
- 7 (c) Alternate Procedure for Certain Con-8 TRIBUTING AGENCIES.—With each application for service or assistance, and with each related recertification, re-10 newal, or change of address, or in the case of an institution of higher education, with each registration of a stu-11 12 dent for enrollment in a course of study, any contributing agency that in the normal course of its operations does not request individuals applying for service or assistance 14 15 to affirm United States citizenship (either directly or as part of the overall application for service or assistance) 16 17 shall—
- 18 (1) complete the requirements of section 7(a)(6) 19 of the National Voter Registration Act of 1993 (52 20 U.S.C. 20506(a)(6));
  - (2) ensure that each applicant's transaction with the agency cannot be completed until the applicant has indicated whether the applicant wishes to register to vote or declines to register to vote in elections for Federal office held in the State; and

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1	(3) for each individual who wishes to register to
2	vote, transmit that individual's information in ac-
3	cordance with subsection (b)(3).
4	(d) REQUIRED AVAILABILITY OF AUTOMATIC REG-
5	ISTRATION OPPORTUNITY WITH EACH APPLICATION FOR
6	SERVICE OR ASSISTANCE.—Each contributing agency
7	shall offer each individual, with each application for serv-
8	ice or assistance, and with each related recertification, re-
9	newal, or change of address, or in the case of an institu-
10	tion of higher education, with each registration of a stu-
11	dent for enrollment in a course of study, the opportunity
12	to register to vote as prescribed by this section without
13	regard to whether the individual previously declined a reg-
14	istration opportunity.
15	(e) Contributing Agencies.—
16	(1) STATE AGENCIES.—In each State, each of
17	the following agencies shall be treated as a contrib-
18	uting agency:
19	(A) Each agency in a State that is re-
20	quired by Federal law to provide voter registra-
21	tion services, including the State motor vehicle
22	authority and other voter registration agencies
23	under the National Voter Registration Act of
24	1993.

- 1 (B) Each agency in a State that admin-2 isters a program pursuant to title III of the So-3 cial Security Act (42 U.S.C. 501 et seq.), title 4 XIX of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. 1396 5 et seq.), or the Patient Protection and Afford-6 able Care Act (Public Law 111–148).
  - (C) Each State agency primarily responsible for regulating the private possession of firearms.
  - (D) Each State agency primarily responsible for maintaining identifying information for students enrolled at public secondary schools, including, where applicable, the State agency responsible for maintaining the education data system described in section 6201(e)(2) of the America COMPETES Act (20 U.S.C. 9871(e)(2)).
  - (E) In the case of a State in which an individual disenfranchised by a criminal conviction may become eligible to vote upon completion of a criminal sentence or any part thereof, or upon formal restoration of rights, the State agency responsible for administering that sentence, or part thereof, or that restoration of rights.

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1	(F) Any other agency of the State which is
2	designated by the State as a contributing agen-
3	cy.
4	(2) FEDERAL AGENCIES.—In each State, each
5	of the following agencies of the Federal Government
6	shall be treated as a contributing agency with re-
7	spect to individuals who are residents of that State
8	(except as provided in subparagraph (C)):
9	(A) The Social Security Administration,
10	the Department of Veterans Affairs, the De-
11	fense Manpower Data Center of the Depart-
12	ment of Defense, the Employee and Training
13	Administration of the Department of Labor,
14	and the Center for Medicare & Medicaid Serv-
15	ices of the Department of Health and Human
16	Services.
17	(B) The Bureau of Citizenship and Immi-
18	gration Services, but only with respect to indi-
19	viduals who have completed the naturalization
20	process.
21	(C) In the case of an individual who is a
22	resident of a State in which an individual
23	disenfranchised by a criminal conviction under
24	Federal law may become eligible to vote upon

completion of a criminal sentence or any part

thereof, or upon formal restoration of rights, the Federal agency responsible for administering that sentence or part thereof (without regard to whether the agency is located in the same State in which the individual is a resident), but only with respect to individuals who have completed the criminal sentence or any part thereof.

- (D) Any other agency of the Federal Government which the State designates as a contributing agency, but only if the State and the head of the agency determine that the agency collects information sufficient to carry out the responsibilities of a contributing agency under this section.
- (3) Institutions of higher education that receives Federal funds shall be treated as a contributing agency in the State in which it is located, but only with respect to students of the institution (including students who attend classes online) who reside in the State. An institution of higher education described in the previous sentence shall be exempt from the voter registration requirements of section 487(a)(23) of the Higher Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C.

- 1 1094(a)(23)) if the institution is in compliance with 2 the applicable requirements of this part.
- 4 Publication.—Not later than 180 days 4 prior to the date of each election for Federal office 5 held in the State, the chief State election official 6 shall publish on the public website of the official an 7 updated list of all contributing agencies in that 8 State.
- 9 (5) PUBLIC EDUCATION.—The chief State elec-10 tion official of each State, in collaboration with each 11 contributing agency, shall take appropriate measures 12 to educate the public about voter registration under 13 this section.
- 14 SEC. 204. ONE-TIME CONTRIBUTING AGENCY ASSISTANCE
- 15 IN REGISTRATION OF ELIGIBLE VOTERS IN
  16 EXISTING RECORDS.
