A BILL

To prohibit the Administrator of the Transportation Security Administration from accepting warrants for the arrest of aliens as valid proof of identification at airport security checkpoints, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Crime Doesn’t Fly Act
5 of 2022”.

1 **SEC. 2. PROHIBITION OF USE OF U.S. IMMIGRATION AND**
2 **CUSTOMS ENFORCEMENT ARREST WAR-**
3 **RANTS AS IDENTIFICATION AT AIRPORT SE-**
4 **CURITY CHECKPOINTS.**

5 (a) IN GENERAL.—Except as provided in subsection
6 (b), the Administrator of the Transportation Security Ad-
7 ministration may not accept a prohibited document as
8 valid proof of identification at an airport security check-
9 point.

10 (b) EXCEPTION.—Subsection (a) shall not apply with
11 respect to an alien who is being removed from the United
12 States in accordance with the immigration laws (as such
13 term is defined in section 101 of the Immigration and Na-
14 tionality Act (8 U.S.C. 1101)).

15 (c) PROHIBITED DOCUMENT DEFINED.—In this sec-
16 tion, the term “prohibited document” means any of the
17 following:

18 (1) U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforce-
19 ment Form I–200, Warrant for Arrest of Alien (or
20 any successor form).

21 (2) U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforce-
22 ment Form I–205, Warrant of Removal/Deportation
23 (or any successor form).

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
