Ms. CORTEZ MASTO (for herself and Mrs. BLACKBURN) introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Small Business and Entrepreneurship

A BILL

To require the Administrator of the Small Business Administration to encourage entrepreneurship training in after school programs, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “21st Century Entre-
5 preneurship Act”.

6 **SEC. 2. FINDINGS.**

7 Congress finds that—

8 (1) entrepreneurship creates new jobs, grows
9 the economy, increases productivity, and signifi-

1 cantly improves the quality of life of the people of
2 the United States;

3 (2) entrepreneurship rates in the United States
4 have declined substantially over the last several dec-
5 ades;

6 (3) children from disadvantaged communities
7 are less likely to become entrepreneurs and inven-
8 tors, hampering economic growth and harming com-
9 munities most in need;

10 (4) studies show that children with mentors in
11 entrepreneurship and inventorship are more likely to
12 pursue these fields in adulthood; and

13 (5) in order to promote growth in disadvan-
14 taged communities, increase entrepreneurship rates,
15 and improve the economy, volunteer mentors with
16 the SCORE program should be encouraged to en-
17 gage with children in community learning centers.

18 **SEC. 3. DEFINITIONS.**

19 In this Act—

20 (1) the term “community learning center” has
21 the meaning given the term in section 4201(b) of
22 the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of
23 1965 (20 U.S.C. 7171(b));

1 (2) the term “inventorship” means the activity
 2 of creating, designing, or otherwise originating a
 3 new product or service; and

4 (3) the term “SCORE program” means the
 5 Service Corps of Retired Executives described in sec-
 6 tion 8(b)(1)(B) of the Small Business Act (15
 7 U.S.C. 637(b)(1)(B)).

8 **SEC. 4. ENTREPRENEURSHIP EDUCATION FOR DISADVAN-**
 9 **TAGED YOUTH.**

10 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Administrator of the Small
 11 Business Administration shall—

12 (1) develop a curriculum for volunteers with the
 13 SCORE program to teach female students, minority
 14 students, English learners, children with disabilities,
 15 and low-income students who are often underrep-
 16 resented in critical and enriching subjects about en-
 17 trepreneurship and inventorship through community
 18 learning centers;

19 (2) develop and implement a strategy to encour-
 20 age partnerships between the SCORE program and
 21 community learning centers to teach the curriculum
 22 developed under paragraph (1) to the students de-
 23 scribed in that paragraph through community learn-
 24 ing centers; and

1 (3) in developing the curriculum required under
2 paragraph (1), collaborate with education specialists,
3 entrepreneurship groups, business groups, and
4 groups with experience serving underrepresented
5 children.

6 (b) COLLABORATION WITH OTHER PROGRAMS.—In
7 carrying out the partnerships under subsection (a)(2), vol-
8 unteers with the SCORE program are encouraged to col-
9 laborate with other entrepreneurial development programs
10 of the Small Business Administration and other agencies,
11 including—

12 (1) small business development centers de-
13 scribed in section 21 of the Small Business Act (15
14 U.S.C. 648);

15 (2) women’s business centers operating under
16 section 29 of the Small Business Act (15 U.S.C.
17 656);

18 (3) centers overseen by the Minority Business
19 Development Agency of the Department of Com-
20 merce; and

21 (4) the Growth Accelerator Fund Competition
22 of the Administration carried out under section 24
23 of the Stevenson-Wydler Technology Innovation Act
24 of 1980 (15 U.S.C. 3719).

1 (c) SCORE PROGRAM.—Section 8(b)(1)(B) of the
 2 Small Business Act (15 U.S.C. 637(b)(1)(B)) is amended,
 3 in the first sentence, by inserting before the period at the
 4 end the following: “and to carry out entrepreneurship and
 5 inventorship programs under section 4(a) of the 21st Cen-
 6 tury Entrepreneurship Act”.

7 (d) COMMUNITY LEARNING CENTERS.—Part B of
 8 title IV of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act
 9 of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 7171 et seq.) is amended—

10 (1) in section 4201(a)(2) (20 U.S.C.
 11 7171(a)(2)), by inserting “entrepreneurship and
 12 inventorship (as defined in section 3 of the 21st
 13 Century Entrepreneurship Act) programs,” after
 14 “apprenticeship programs,”; and

15 (2) in section 4205(a) (20 U.S.C. 7175(a))—

16 (A) in paragraph (13), by striking “and”
 17 at the end;

18 (B) in paragraph (14), by striking the pe-
 19 riod at the end and inserting “; and”; and

20 (C) by adding at the end the following:

21 “(15) entrepreneurship and inventorship pro-
 22 grams described in section 4(a) of the 21st Century
 23 Entrepreneurship Act.”.

24 (e) REPORT.—Not later than 1 year after the date
 25 of enactment of this Act, and every 2 years thereafter,

1 the Administrator of the Small Business Administration
 2 shall submit to the Committee on Small Business and En-
 3 trepreneurship of the Senate and the Committee on Small
 4 Business of the House of Representatives a report that—

5 (1) identifies each partnership between the
 6 SCORE program and a community learning center
 7 during the preceding 2-year period;

8 (2) documents the use of funds by the SCORE
 9 program, and adherence by the SCORE program to
 10 contract award and procurement procedures, relat-
 11 ing to the implementation of this Act;

12 (3) documents any training or guidance pro-
 13 vided to SCORE program chapter leadership on
 14 properly using funds provided to carry out this Act;

15 (4) estimates the number of students who were
 16 reached through the entrepreneurship curriculum de-
 17 veloped under subsection (a);

18 (5) identifies any barriers to reaching additional
 19 students; and

20 (6) identifies any plans for improving the cur-
 21 riculum or implementing the strategy developed
 22 under subsection (a).

23 (f) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—

24 (1) IN GENERAL.—There is authorized to be
 25 appropriated to the Administrator of the Small

1 Business Administration \$2,500,000 for each of fis-
2 cal years 2021 through 2025 to carry out this Act
3 and the amendments made by this Act.

4 (2) TRANSFER OF FUNDS.—Of amounts made
5 available to the Administrator of the Small Business
6 Administration to carry out this Act and the amend-
7 ments made by this Act, the Administrator may
8 transfer any portion of those amounts to the
9 SCORE program to carry out such provisions.

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
