ferred to the Committee on Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs

A BILL

To repeal the sunset provision of the Iran Sanctions Act
of 1996, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Solidify Iran Sanctions
5 Act of 2022”.

6 **SEC. 2. FINDINGS.**

7 Congress makes the following findings:

8 (1) The Iran Sanctions Act of 1996 (Public
9 Law 104–172; 50 U.S.C. 1701 note) requires the
10 imposition of sanctions with respect to Iran’s illicit

1 weapons programs, conventional weapons and bal-
 2 listic missile development, and support for terrorism,
 3 including Iran’s Revolutionary Guards Corps.

4 (2) The Government of Iran has acquired de-
 5 stabilizing conventional weapons systems from the
 6 Russian Federation and other malign actors, and is
 7 funneling weapons and financial support to its ter-
 8 rorist proxies throughout the Middle East, threat-
 9 ening allies and partners of the United States, such
 10 as Israel.

11 **SEC. 3. STATEMENT OF POLICY.**

12 It is the policy of the United States to fully imple-
 13 ment and enforce the Iran Sanctions Act of 1996 (Public
 14 Law 104–172; 50 U.S.C. 1701 note).

15 **SEC. 4. REPEAL OF SUNSET.**

16 Section 13 of the Iran Sanctions Act of 1996 (Public
 17 Law 104–172; 50 U.S.C. 1701 note) is amended—

18 (1) in the section heading, by striking “; **SUN-**
 19 **SET**”;

20 (2) by striking “(a) EFFECTIVE DATE.—”; and

21 (3) by striking subsection (b).

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
