S. 3541. An act to improve health care and services for veterans exposed to toxic substances, and for other purposes.

S. 3706. An act to provide for the application of certain provisions of the Secure Rural Schools and Community Self-Determination Act of 2000 for fiscal year 2021.



AMACHE NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE ACT

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Chair lays before the House the following bill (H.R. 2497) to establish the Amache National Historic Site in the State of Colorado as a unit of the National Park System and for other purposes, along with the Senate amendments thereto.

The Clerk read the title of the bill.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Clerk will report the Senate amendments.

The Clerk read as follows:

Senate amendments:

(1) In section 3, strike subsection (f) and insert the following:

(f) LAND ACQUISITION AUTHORITY.—The Secretary may acquire land or interests in land located within the boundary of the Camp Amache National Historic Landmark, as generally depicted on the Map, only by donation.

(2)On page 4, line 13, strike [paragraph (1)] and insert *subsection* (f).

(3)On page 6, line 17, strike [(1) The town of Granada, Colorado, shall maintain responsibility for the operation and maintenance] and insert.

- (1) EFFECT.—Nothing in this Act affects the authority of the town of Granada, Colorado, with respect to the operation and maintenance (4)On page 7, line 1, strike [(2) The Secretary shall provide the town of and insert:
- (2) DETERMINATION.—The Secretary shall provide the town of
- (5)On page 7, line 6, strike (3) to end of line 20 and insert:
- (3) NEW WATER INFRASTRUCTURE.—The Secretary may permit the town of Granada, Colorado, to construct or install new water infrastructure, systems, or appurtenances—

- (A) consistent with applicable laws;
- (B) limited to the areas determined to be necessary under paragraph (2); and
- (C) in a manner that ensures the preservation, protection, and proper management of the National Historic Site.
- (4) ACCEPTANCE OF DONATED WATER INFRASTRUCTURE.—The Secretary may accept, for addition to and administration as part of the National Historic Site, the donation of water infrastructure, systems, or appurtenances within the boundary of the National Historic Site, including associated water rights, if the water infrastructure, systems, or appurtenances are no longer used by the town of Granada, Colorado.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. (during the reading) Without objection, the reading is dispensed with.
