The rule waives all points of order against consideration of each such bill. The rule provides that each such bill shall be considered as read. The rule waives all points of order against provisions in each such bill. The rule provides one hour of general debate on each such bill equally divided and controlled by the chair and ranking minority member of the Committee on Energy and Commerce or their respective designees. The rule provides each such bill one motion to recommit. The rule further provides for consideration of H. Res. 1156, Expressing support for tax policies that support working families, under a closed rule. The rule provides that upon adoption of the resolution it shall be in order without intervention of any point of order to consider H. Res. 1156. The rule provides that H. Res. 1156 shall be considered as read. Finally, the rule provides one hour of general debate equally divided and controlled by the chair and ranking minority member of the Committee on Ways and Means or their respective designees. The Committee granted, by a record vote of 6–4, a rule providing for consideration of H.R. 8035, To amend the FISA Amendments Act of 2008 to extend the authorities of title VII of the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act of 1978 through October 20, 2027, and for other purposes, under a closed rule. The rule waives all points of order against consideration of the bill. The rule provides that the bill shall be considered as read. The rule waives all points of order against provisions in the bill. The rule provides one hour of general debate equally divided among and

controlled by the chair and ranking minority member of the Committee on the Judiciary or their respective designees and the chair and ranking minority member of the Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence or their respective designees. Finally, the rule provides one motion to recommit. Testimony was heard from Chairman Jordan, and Representatives Palmer, Tonko, Kelly of Pennsylvania, Sánchez, Raskin, and Himes.
